In our Academic Writing course, you will learn how to write a research paper using the writing process. Your paper will go through the stages of brainstorming, drafting, peer editing and revision. In addition, you will learn how to paraphrase, summarize and cite outside sources using APA citation style. Finally, you will learn how to read critically so that you can distinguish between facts and opinions. Classroom discussions, pair and group work will play a key role in helping you develop your critical thinking skills.
